# **Jeff's Jottings**

As I've prepared for the first two theme Sundays of Season of Creation, I have been amazed how essential and life giving both our forests/trees and our land/soil are. It's not that I did not know they were important before this, but that understanding was reinforced and deepened considerably.

Every time you eat an apple or orange, a peach or pear or plum, thank a tree for its fruitful bounty. Every time you sit at a table or go inside a house, thank a tree for giving its life. Every time you take a breath of fresh air, thank a tree for cleaning that air and making it suitable for your lungs. It is not an exaggeration to say that without trees on this planet, there would not be life – at least not most animal life.



Which brings us to the land. Speaking of life producing! It is out of the land that the trees and all plants, for that matter, are given life and grow. Just like it is fair to say there would be no life without trees, we can say the same thing of the soil. But animals don't emerge from the soil you may argue. That is true, but ultimately, everything we use for nourishment somehow goes back to the life that emerges from the soil. For even when we eat meat, we are consuming something that relied on plant life for its nutrients.

And as I made the point last Sunday in my message, the land doesn't only give life, but it also receives life. For all living things – plants or animals - ultimately decompose and decay and are returned to the soil, making it rich and able to produce life in the future. Our soil is the penultimate recycler!

And of course there is this symbiotic relationship between the trees and land (each is dependent on and strengthened by the other). As we anticipate the changing colors of Autumn, we should remember that we



are watching this relationship play out before our very eyes. For as the leaves fall from the trees, they are literally feeding the soil. Over the winter and early spring, those leaves will dry and decay and quickly become part of the soil. That soil, in turn, will become nutrient rich and feed those very trees from which the leaves fell. Trees depend on good soil to remain healthy, while soil depends on trees to remain healthy.

If Season of Creation gives you nothing else but a deep sense of appreciation for the God who built in incredible intricacies and interconnectedness throughout this world, then it is a worthwhile liturgical season. But I would hope this would also give you cause to ponder humanity's part in Creation as well. Humans, too, are interconnected with Creation.

Interestingly, however, whereas there on many natural symbiotic relations within Creation, I'm not sure that is the case for humanity. Humanity is incredibly dependent on many parts of Creation, namely things like trees and soil (as well as air and water and a whole lot of other things). But I have a tough time coming up with something in Creation

that is dependent on humanity. There are many parts of Creation that have been drastically altered by humanity's actions, but are there any nonhuman animals or plants or other aspects of Creation that depend on us for their health and growth?

If I am right about this, the question of how we as humanity should relate to Creation is a pertinent one. If we are dependent upon Creation for so much, which really can't be in question, then we should make sure we are not guilty of "biting the hand that feeds us." The implications of that idiom may be able to inform us in our actions. For "biting the hand that feeds you" is a metaphor referring to a dog that bites its master. We feed dogs with the expectation that they respond with love and affection for us, and maybe protection as well. So if Creation provides so much for us and we are dependent on it, how ought we respond? Well, with love and affection is a start. Doing our best to protect it would follow.

Each week we proclaim, "I believe in God the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth." If that truly is the foundation of our faith, then it should not be surprising to hear that God calls us to care for and protect Creation. And the Church, and our denomination, as well as our congregations, should be leading the world in loving, nurturing, and protecting Creation.

So, as we proclaim in worship during this season, "Go in peace. Care for Creation. Thanks be to God."

- General Treasury ending balance August 31, 2023 was (\$13.81)
- Sterling Commercial Roofing will start the new roof on or before October 17, 2023. It should take around two weeks to complete.
- Keith Zoeller, the farm manager, attended the Council Meeting. He stated that he sent out 22 notifications to participate in the farm lottery. Ten names were in the drawing. Brandon Heiman was drawn and Nick Ganz was the alternate.
- Confirmation classes have started. Parents are taking turns every Sunday morning with classes and Pastor Jeff will have a Wednesday evening class once a month.
- Rally Sunday was held on September 10<sup>th</sup> with a Blessing of Backpacks Service, pancake breakfast, and a God's Work Our Hands project.

# First Council Highlights September 17, 2023

- Council approved a special checking account for handling rent income & repair cost items for leasing the parsonage.
- Church Mutual approved a funding shortage for replacing the church steeple cross & sent additional funding for that work.
- Landowner permission was received to remove the rusted church sign from along U.S. Highway 30.
- A Congregational Meeting was discussed to reduce the quorum requirements for such meetings & to get approval for studying and setting up a non-profit charitable organization that would provide long-term funding of church properties such as the cemetery. The Council will meet after a future worship to approve the date of such meeting.
